Christus Natus Est was composed in 2007 and is based on five carols - Personent hodie, Entre le boeuf, Gaudete, Infant Holy, and Angelus ad virginem.

Quatre motets pour le temps de Noël Francis Poulenc (1899-1963)

In the Christmas motets, composed in 1952, we find Poulenc at his most relaxed as he joyfully celebrates the events of the Christmas story. The texts are those traditionally associated with the Gregorian chants set for Christmas and the Epiphany.

Coventry Carol

The Coventry Carol dates from the 16th century. The carol was traditionally performed in Coventry as part of a mystery play called The Pageant of the Shearmen and Tailors. The play depicts the Christmas story from St Matthew's Gospel: the carol itself refers to the Massacre of the Innocents, in which Herod ordered all male infants under the age of two in Bethlehem to be killed, and takes the form of a lullaby sung by mothers of the doomed children.

Elizabeth Poston was an English composer, pianist and writer. She attended the Royal Academy of Music where both Peter Warlock and Ralph Vaughan Williams encouraged her talents. After graduating she went abroad between 1930 and 1939, where she studied architecture and collected folksongs. She returned to England at the beginning of World War II and joined the BBC, becoming Director of Music in the European Service. She composed scores for radio and television productions - over 40 for radio alone - collaborating with C.S. Lewis, Dylan Thomas, and other writers. The first known publication of the words of this carol was in London's *Spiritual Magazine* in August, 1761.
